What is the origin of Valentine's Day?



There are some suggestions that the holiday's roots are in the ancient Roman festival of Lupercalia, a fertility celebration commemorated annually on February 15. Pope Gelasius I recast this pagan festival as a Christian feast day circa 496, declaring February 14 to be St. Valentine's Day.



Formal messages, or <u>valentines</u>, appeared in the 1500s, and by the late 1700s commercially printed cards were being used. The first commercial valentines in the <u>United States</u> were printed in the mid-1800s. Valentines commonly depict <u>Cupid</u>, the Roman god of love, along with hearts, traditionally the seat of emotion. Because it was thought that the avian mating season begins in mid-February, <u>birds</u> also became a symbol of the day. Traditional gifts include <u>candy</u> and <u>flowers</u>, particularly red <u>roses</u>, a symbol of beauty and love.

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The Food Sharing Project is a registered not-for-profit charity established 40 years ago. We are the organization that provides the food for in-school breakfast, lunch and hearty snack programs across Kingston, and throughout Frontenac and Lennox & Addington Counties.

Students come to school without enough food for a variety of reasons and educators and research tell us that when they can eat nutritious food at school, students are more engaged in their learning, can focus better on tasks and can have more positive social interactions throughout the day. They are also more willing to try something new, which can lead to better food choices as adults.

Our organization packs and delivers 5 tonnes of food each week, a value of over \$20,000. That translates to roughly 12,000 healthy meals or snacks, every week! School coordinators place orders from our list of nutritious food, and our volunteers pack over 450 boxes – every week – of fresh fruits and vegetables, whole grain products, and protein foods.

Our staff then deliver the food right to the doors of the schools each week. We deliver to 88 elementary and secondary schools and alternative education programs in four schools boards. We travel about 700 kms every week.



For some students, school can be only place they get a meal, or a healthy meal. You know how you feel if lunch is a little late. Imagine a child struggling to do the hard things we ask them to do in school without having had breakfast that morning, or for some, dinner the night before.

One in six families in KFL&A experiences chool every day, families can spend food insecurity (up from 1 in 9 a year ago), so when we provide healthy food at stheir limited income on rent, utilities, or put gas in their car to get to work. Since the onset of the pandemic in 2020, more families have relied on in-school nutrition programs, and we have seen the demand for food at schools increase dramatically.



Our funding comes from the Province of Ontario, contributions from each of the four school boards we serve, national and local foundations, the United Way, and about a quarter of our funding come from generous donations and fundraisers.

Thanks to these funders and supporters, school nutrition programs are available at no cost to any student who needs nutrition to make it through the day, in a stigma-free environment.

Schools organize their food program according to their availability of volunteers, time and space. Typically, healthy snacks are placed in bins for coolers that are distributed to classrooms, or are set up at grab and go stations where students can take what they need. Some schools pack brown-bag lunches, and some offer sit-down lunch programs.

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Students tell us that the food they have at school really makes a difference. Younger students tell us that the food makes them feel happy. A grade 5 student told one of our volunteers that he didn't know why, but math was a lot easier after he had something to eat. Secondary students tell us that having food to grab on the way to class just helps them get there.


This brewery is owned by Russ Snowdon's son.
